From the Pastor's Desk



"If you love me, you will keep my commandments.

And I will ask the Father, and he will give you another Advocate, to be with you forever"

In this passage, Jesus was referring to the Holy Spirit whom He was about to send from the Father at that time. Later on, the Apostles by the power of the Holy Spirit began proclaiming the Gospel and performing miracles in Jesus' name; more details of which, we find in today's first reading. This account taken from the Act of the Apostles tells us how Philip was zealous in proclaiming the word of

God and how happy the Samaritans were when they could hear the Gospel. Philip and other Apostles took seriously what Jesus had told them to do when He had sent them out to the whole world in order to proclaim the Gospel, to baptize people and to make disciples of all the nations. The Apostles were very dedicated to their mission. They really believed that Jesus Christ was their Lord and the Saviour of the world and this faith gave them eagerness in preaching, strength in adversities and joy in doing the will of God. Their mission by human means was unmanageable to perform. Yet, the grace of God made it possible and the Gospel was widely spread. The Apostles performed many wonders in the name of the Lord and they cured numerous people. The Acts of the Apostles tell us about innumerable miracles that the disciples of Jesus performed. The example of the apostles encourages us to follow the Gospel with eagerness and joy. In fact, we have at hand all we need to overcome difficulties and find healing. What is it? The word of God and the Sacraments. First of all, the Sunday Eucharist is of great importance because during Mass, our Lord really speaks to us and gives Himself to us in Holy Communion. We should consider the Sunday Mass more a privilege than a tiring obligation.

This Thursday, May 18th, we observe a memorial of Saint John I, Pope and Martyr. He lived in the 6th century. Pope John I inherited the Arian heresy, which denied the divinity of Christ. Italy had been ruled for 30 years by Theodoric the Goth. This emperor espoused the Arian heresy, though he treated the empire's Catholics with tolerance. His policy changed at about the time the young John was elected pope.

When the eastern emperor began imposing severe measures on the Arians of his area, the western emperor forced John to head a delegation to the East to soften the measures against the heretics. Little is known of the manner or outcome of the negotiations designed to secure continued tolerance of Catholics in the West, but on his way home, John was imprisoned at Ravenna because the emperor had begun to suspect that John's friendship with his eastern rival might lead to a conspiracy against his throne. Shortly after his imprisonment, John died, apparently from the treatment he received in prison. John's body was transported to Rome and he was buried in the Basilica of St. Peter.

This Friday, May 19th, the Novena (9 days of prayer) in preparation for Pentecost Sunday begins.
