From the Pastor's Desk

"Thus it is written, that the Christ is to suffer and to rise from the dead on the third day, and that repentance and forgiveness of sins is to be proclaimed in His name to all nations, beginning from Jerusalem. You are witnesses of these things."

One of the striking aspects of today's passage of the Gospel is the transformation that occurs within the disciples. Initially, they are filled with doubt and disbelief, unable to comprehend the miraculous events they have witnessed. Jesus appearing to them, invites them to touch His wounds, demonstrating the reality of His resurrection. This moment of tangible encounter with the risen Christ is pivotal for the disciples. It transforms their doubt into belief and fills them with a newfound sense of hope and purpose. Moreover, Jesus opens their minds to understand the Scriptures, showing how His death and resurrection were foretold in the Old Testament. Jesus not only confirms their role as witnesses to His resurrection but also empowers them to continue His mission of proclaiming repentance and forgiveness of sins to all nations.



This Wednesday, April 17th, we observe the memorial of Saint Kateri Tekakwitha, Virgin and Protectress of Canada. St. Kateri Tekakwitha is the first Native American to be recognized as a saint by the Catholic Church. She was born in 1656, in the Mohawk village of Ossernenon. Her mother was an Algonquin, who was captured by the Mohawks and who took a Mohawk chief for her husband. Kateri was known as a skilled worker, who was diligent and patient. However, she refused to marry. When her adoptive parents proposed a suitor to her, she refused to entertain the proposal. They punished her by giving her more work to do, but she did not give in. Instead, she remained quiet and diligent. Eventually they were

forced to relent and accept that she had no interest in marriage. At age 19, Kateri Tekakwitha converted to Catholicism, taking a vow of chastity and pledging to marry only Jesus Christ. Her decision was very unpopular with her adoptive parents and their neighbors. Some of her neighbors started rumors of sorcery. To avoid persecution, she traveled to a Christian native community south of Montreal. According to legend, Kateri was very devout and would put thorns on her sleeping mat. She often prayed for the conversion of her fellow Mohawks. According to the Jesuit missionaries that served the community where Kateri lived, she often fasted and when she would eat, she would taint her food to diminish its flavor. On at least one occasion, she burned herself. Such self-mortification was common among the Mohawk. Kateri was very devout and was known for her steadfast devotion. She was also very sickly. Her practices of self-mortification and denial may not have helped her health. Sadly, just five years after her conversion to Catholicism, she became ill and passed away at age 24, on April 17, 1680. Her name, Kateri, is the Mohawk form of Catherine, which she took from (cont...)
